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ANSWERS.

1) D Both A and B

According to urban legend, niacin (vitamin B3) can be taken to cleanse the body of drugs to pass drug tests as well as counteract the intense hunger (commonly called “the munchies”) brought on by marijuana use. In high doses, niacin can cause nausea, vomiting, blood poisoning and liver failure.

2) C Instant-messaging someone about something really funny

ROTFL is instant-messenger and cell phone “text language” for “rolling on the floor laughing.” Text language frequently uses acronyms to shorten longer sentences or phrases.

3) D Both A and B

In the video game rating system, “M” stands for “mature” (aged 17 and older), and “AO” stands for “adults only” (aged 18 and older). Games with these ratings contain content such as violence, gore, and sexual content that may not be suitable for persons younger than 18, respectively.

4) C Drinking cough syrup and soda

“Lean” is an illegal drug concoction of prescription cough syrup containing the painkiller codeine mixed with soda or another sweet beverage.

5) A Glue and shoe polish

Many household products can be abused as inhalants. Among children age 12-17 using inhalants for the first time, glue and shoe polish are the most commonly abused. Chronic abuse of solvents can cause severe, long-term damage to the brain, the liver, and the kidneys; and highly concentrated amounts of the chemicals in inhalants can directly induce heart failure and death, a syndrome known as “sudden sniffing death.”

6) C 75

Including “friends” on social networking Web sites, teens claim to have an average of 75 friends.

7) B **Celebrity personal assistant**

According to a poll conducted of 653 middle-school students, celebrity fame is so central to youth culture that if given a choice of becoming the CEO of a major corporation, the president of Yale or Harvard, a Navy SEAL, a U.S. senator or “the personal assistant to a very famous singer or movie star,” almost half of the girls (43.4%) chose the celebrity assistant role.

10) D **An activity in which participants restrict the supply of oxygen to the brain to induce a hallucinogenic state**

The “choking game” is a dangerous activity in which participants literally choke each other or themselves, thus temporarily restricting blood to the brain thus creating a cheap way to get high. While this game has been played for many years, teens today are taking it to extreme levels, sometimes resulting in death. This “game” is widely known in its various forms and teens can easily access directions and videos online showing how to perform this dangerous act.

11) C An online form of flirtation on a social networking Web site

While most social networking Web sites have a unique term for members to electronically contact each other, the wildly popular Facebook site uses the term “poke.” Facebook.com encourages its users to interpret the “poke” in different ways, but it is generally considered a form of online flirtation.

12) B Scantly dressed teenage girls who emulate young, wild celebrities

“Prostitots” refer to young girls, especially tweens (aged 10-14), who dress in sexual or revealing fashions and engage in risky behaviors which may involve drug use and sexual activity.

13) C Sweet-tasting alcoholic beverages popular with teens

“Alcopops” refers to a variety of sweetly-flavored, potent alcoholic drinks that mask the flavor of alcohol. Parents should monitor for these types of drinks because their sweet flavor and generally high alcohol content makes them an appealing way for teens to get drunk.

14) C They are harmless-sounding names for drugs

“Space cakes” and “skittles” are harmless-sounding names for drugs. Space cakes are drug-infused baked goods, such as pot brownies. Skittles refers to OTC pills for coughs containing DXM that can be abused if taken in large doses.
